# Duke of Edinburgh

# **Smashed Project**

Students from Years 7-10 participated in the Smashed Project. The Smashed Project is a powerful educational theatre and interactive workshop to engage students on the dangers of underage drinking. Students follow the lives of three young people and witness how they become involved in alcohol and how it affects their lives, culminating in a tragic accident. The presentation allowed students to consider the facts about underage drinking, and develop strategies for resisting peer influence.

This is a great way to assist your young person to keep track of what is required of them for their assessment tasks. Many of these assessments are undertaken at school where the work is completed under supervision of the teacher. A number of tasks are embedded within the units and are built upon as the learning continues. Some assessments take the form of tests where students need to apply the knowledge they have gained throughout the learning phase and some require students to undertake preparation work or to complete some part of the task at home. At least two weeks prior to the due date of the task, teachers will provide students with a detailed overview of the task including the outcomes being addressed and the criteria that will be used to measure achievement. If your student has questions about the assessment they should speak to their teacher. If they need assistance they can also ask their teacher or attend our STRIVE Tutorial Centre which is held every Monday and Wednesday after school in the Library for 1.5 hours. Free tutors are available to assist students in assessment tasks and to help them to overcome any difficulties they have in their learning.

I hope this will assist parents to help their young people to ensure they have a plan to complete the work as it arises. Have a safe and happy holiday and I look forward to the great things we will achieve next term.

# Nothing but Netball



Respect, Responsibility and Ready to Learn

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It is now possible for parents to make online payments to the school for amounts owing for students, via a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. Payments can be made using either a Visa or MasterCard credit or debit card, and can be made via computer, tablet or mobile phone. The payment page is accessed from the front page of the school's website by selecting <u>Make a payment</u>.

When you access the <u>\$ Make a payment</u> you must enter: the students name, class, date of birth

These details are entered each time you make a payment as student information is not held within the payment system.

This is a secure payment system hosted by Westpac to ensure that your credit/debit card details are captured in a secure manner, these details are not passed back to the school. You have the ability to check and change any details of the payment before the payment is processed. Receipts can be emailed and/or printed.

Details of the payments are passed daily to the school where they will be receipted against your child's account. As a receipt has been issued from the payment page a further receipt will not be issued by the school. If unsure of amount owing please contact the school first before making the payment. ## MathSpace

Mathspace was created to give every student step-by-step learning and instantaneous feedback, making it just like a personal tutor. Mathspace helps to identify student strengths and weaknesses and learning gaps, giving personalised maths help involving interactive practice questions, step-by-step feedback and video lessons.

Ethics.

Our school has adopted an online bullying reporting system called Stymie. Stymie equips your child with the tools to be an upstander—someone who supports their peers in times of need. Stymie helps combat the bystander effect by enabling students to report incidents of bullying and harm, safely and anonymously.

Social influence affects how bystanders behave, and students are less likely to stand up to bullying behaviours in public when the number of onlookers is high. This bystander effect is also caused by a diffusion of responsibility—the belief that someone else will help.

Taking into account that our kids are very socially invested, many of them don't feel as though they can speak up and often, they just don't know how. Stymie aims to rather than trying to work against this peer pressure, our solution recognises the nuanced nature of their social currency, by providing security and
